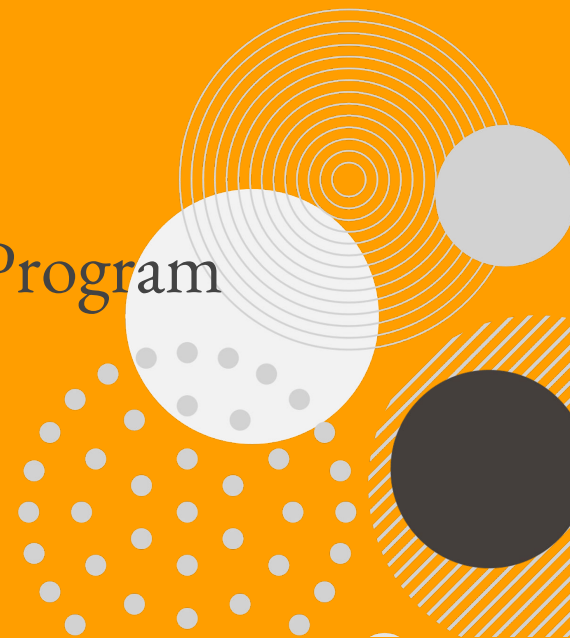

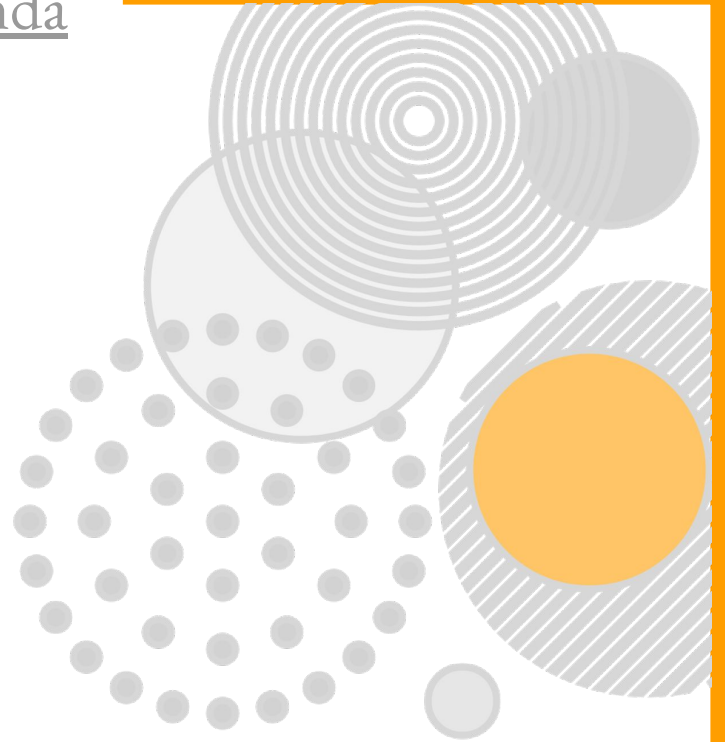

Anti-Trafficking Programs

Building Bridges to Hope: Anti-Trafficking Initiative provides the following services:

- **Comprehensive Case Management** provides participants with connecting/navigating needed services to promote self-sufficiency, resiliency, and empowerment. Survivors will learn to navigate and obtain needed services via Adult Skills Training. Skills training can consist of Employment Skills & Navigation, Housing, Coping Skills, Budgeting, Parenting Skills, Communication Skills, Navigating Immigration/Legal Paperwork, Government Service Enrollment & Navigation, and much more.
- **Community Education & Training** via Human Trafficking 101 classes tailored to community providers, i.e. LGBTQ+, males, etc.
- **Outreach** within the community at community events, local partners (i.e. Mexican Consultant, Catholic Charities, Streetlight USA, International Rescue Committee, ASU STIR, and many others).

Program Eligibility

Currently enrolling participants that are:

- 18 years or older
- Domestic or Foreign born
- Resides in Arizona
- Completes Screening assessment
- Meets criteria as a victim/survivor of Sex and/or Labor Trafficking

2. Complete the required screening process for program enrollment

3. If criteria below is met after screening, an intake will be conducted for program enrollment

Sex trafficking is defined as the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, obtaining, patronizing, or soliciting of a person for the purposes of a commercial sex act, in which the commercial sex act is induced by **force, fraud, or coercion**, or in which the person induced to perform such an act has not attained 18 years of age.

Labor trafficking is defined as the recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services, through the use of **force, fraud, or coercion** for the purposes of subsection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery

Labor Trafficking Efforts

CPLC has identified 494 victims of Labor Trafficking since the inception of services in October of 2020 through outreach and referral. Although they did not all engage in enrollment of services CPLC was able to educate them on their labor rights, provide pamphlets about their rights, CPLC services, provide them with general resources, and an outreach sack (included resources, snacks and beverages.)

Current Labor Trafficking Numbers

13 enrolled participants

- **10 participants** were tricked/forced to perform work for money, drugs, protection, clothing, and shelter
- **6 participants** were promised work, where the work or payment ended up being different than what they expected.
- **4 participants** had someone control the money they earned in exchange for drugs, food, shelter, clothing, or protection.
- **3 participants** reported they were afraid to leave or quit the LT situation for fear of violence towards them or their family.
- Participants reported being between **16 years old and 34 years old** at the time of occurrence.
- Traffickers include: Significant Other (SO), Friend, Past SO, and Unknown
- Participants reported LT consisted of the following job sectors: Sexualized Labor (pornography & strip club), Agriculture, Childcare, and Domestic Servant

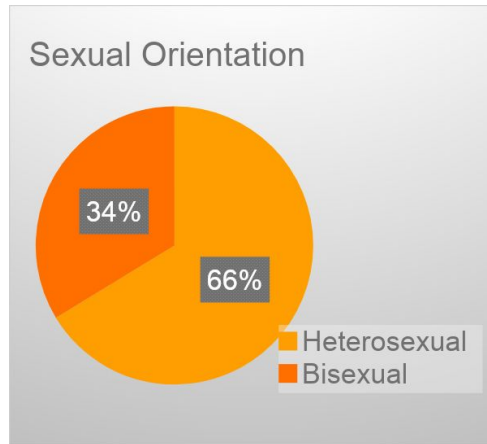
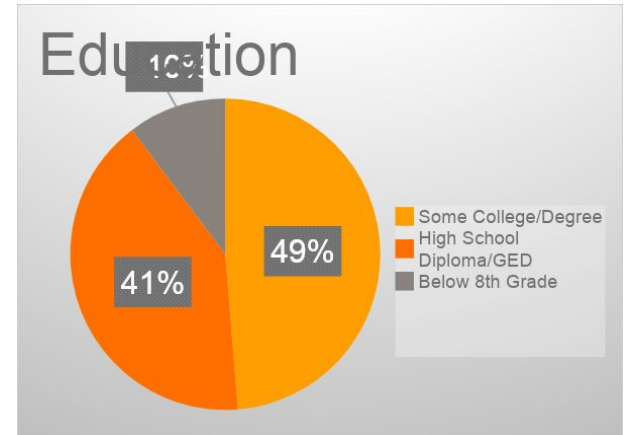
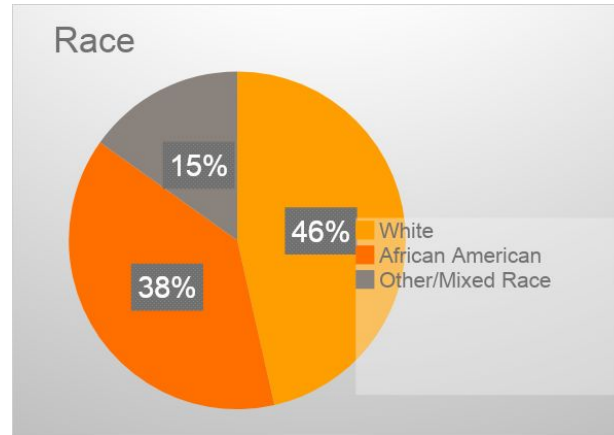
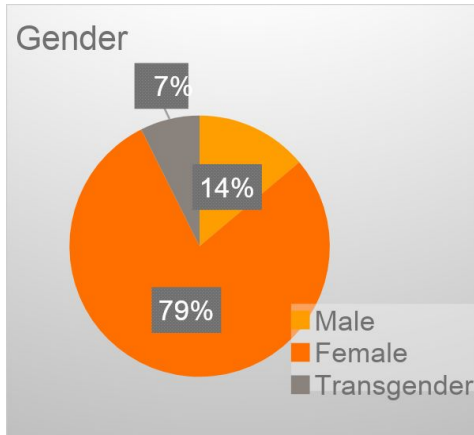

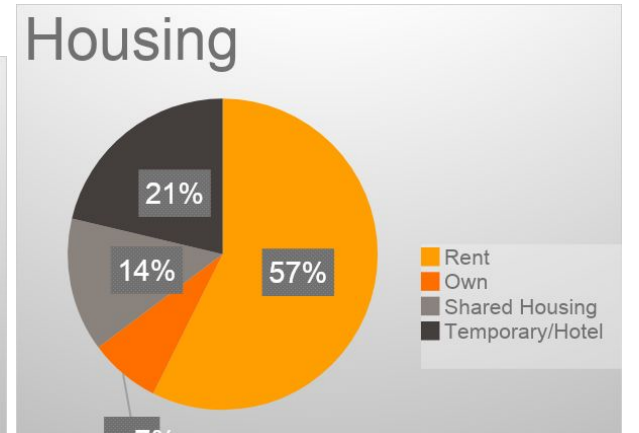

LT Participant Demographics

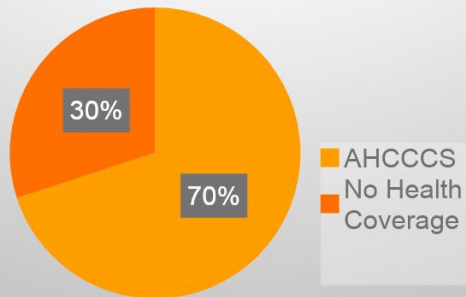


38% reported that they were of Hispanic, Latin or Spanish descent

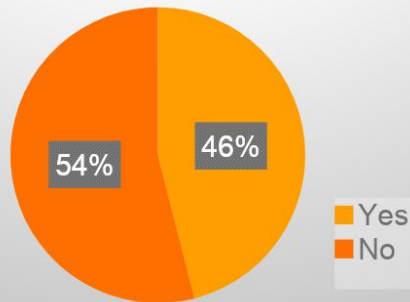


LT Participant Demographics

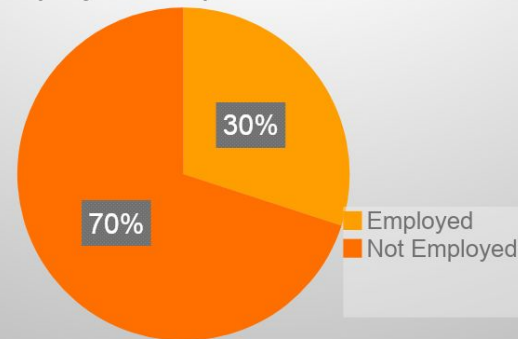
Health Insurance



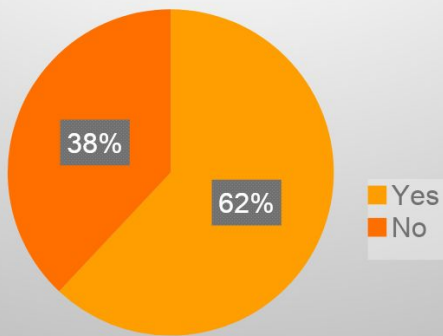
Substance Abuse History



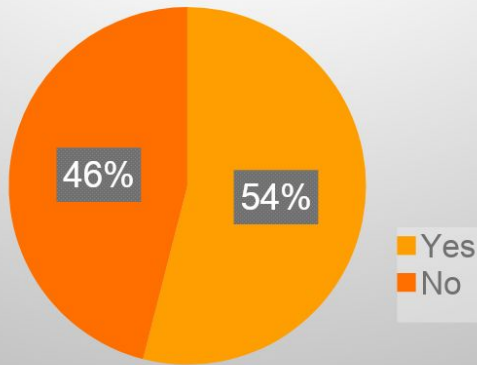
Employment upon Enrollment



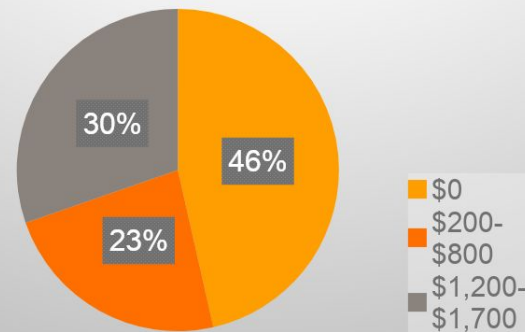
Behavioral Health Diagnosis



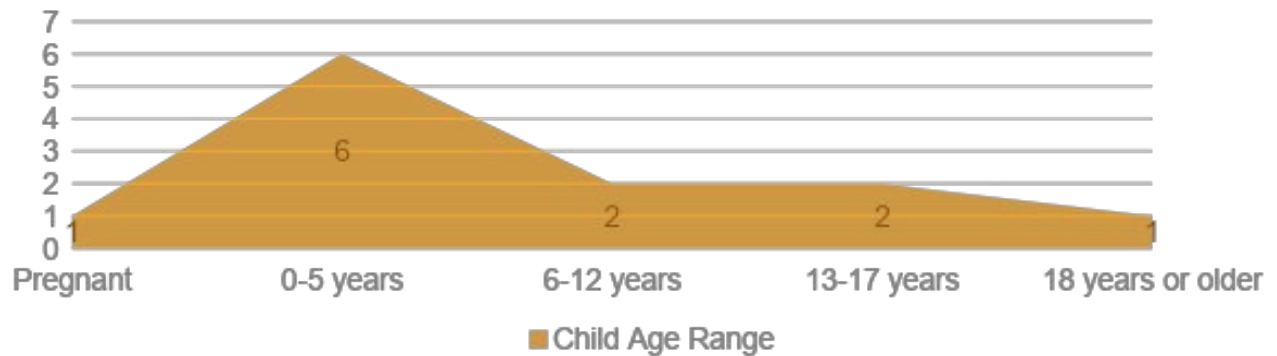
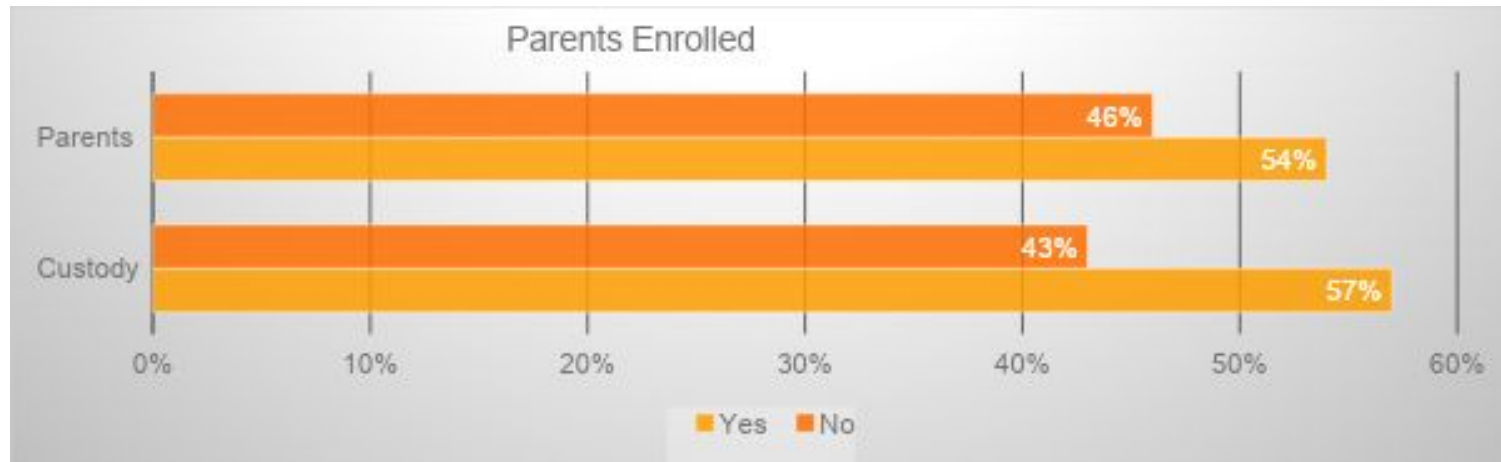
Legal Involvement

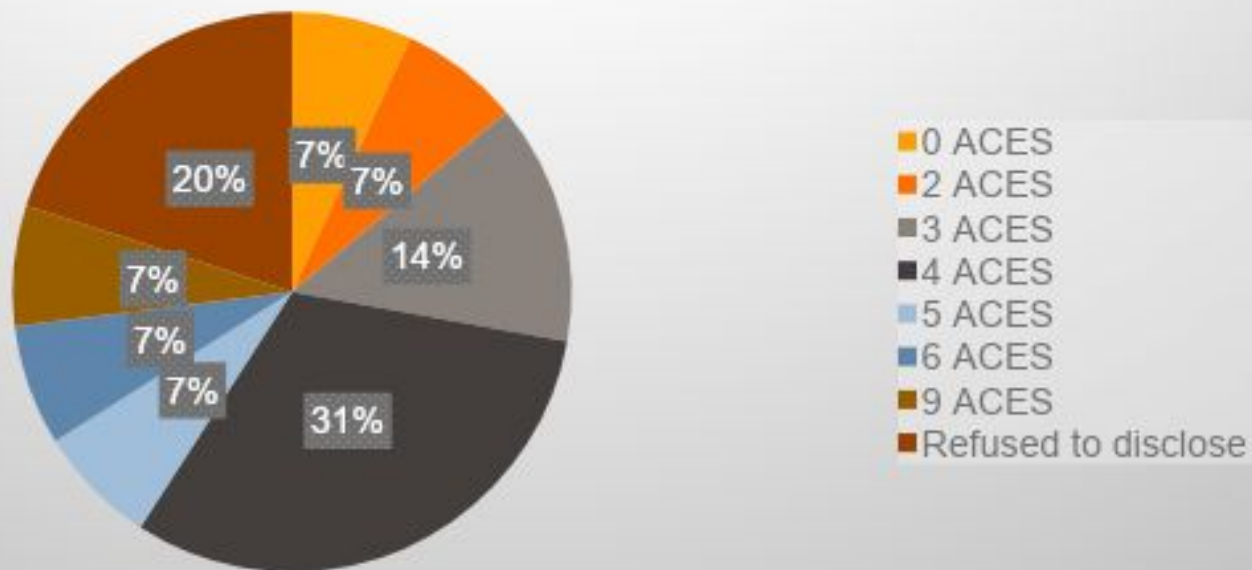




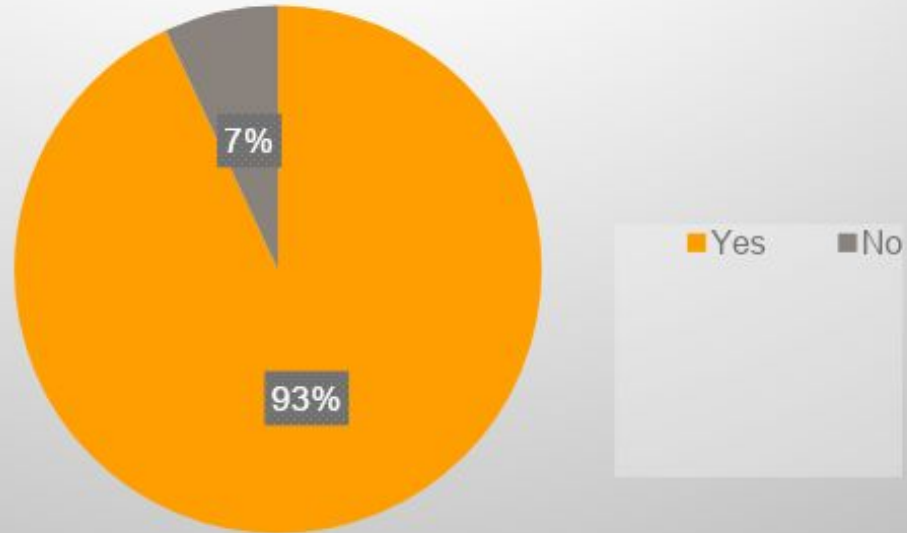

Reported Adverse Childhood Experiences

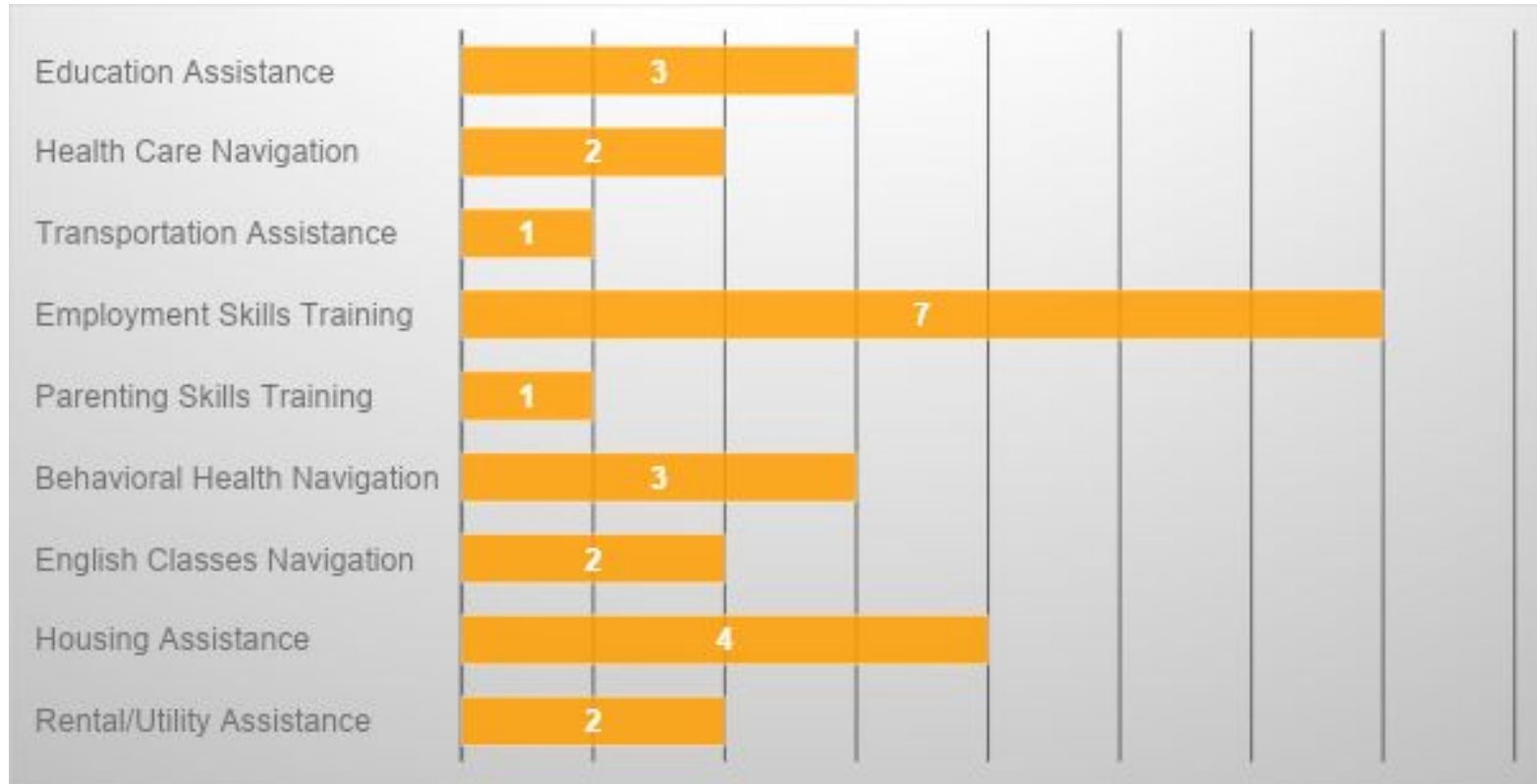


Reported Sex Trafficking
