




About the Arizona Youth Survey

The Arizona Criminal Justice Commission, in partnership with Arizona State University, administers the Arizona Youth Survey every even year. (A.R.S. § 41-2416)

- Arizona's leading tool to assess the frequency of problematic behaviors and their corelates in our youth. The AYS focuses on the following:
 - Substance Use

- Gang Involvement

- Risky Behaviors

- Risk and Protective Factors
- 2022 implementation had a Total of 51,448 8th, 10th & 12th grade students from 301 schools participate across all 15 counties
- The survey is:
 - Anonymous Voluntary Free for schools Online
 - Based on nationally recognized survey methodology
- Schools or Districts decide to take the AYS parental notification is provided and passive parental consent forms are provided in accordance with state law
- The AYS is the nation's largest, longest-running survey of youth

Arizona Youth Survey Instrument

- Substance Use (30-Day/Lifetime)
- Risk and Protective Factors (Communities That Care)
- Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs)
- Positive Childhood Experiences (PCEs)
- Exposure to Bullying/Violence in School
- Impaired Driving/Texting or Talking while Driving






Youth Substance Use – Key Points

Overall trends in substance use continue to go down!!!!

Most commonly Abused Substances (Grade 12, past 30 days)

- 1. Alcohol 22.6%
- 2. Marijuana 17.5%
- 3. E-cigarettes 14.8%

4. Marijuana Concentrates – 13.6% *If you look at lifetime use, marijuana concentrates jumps to #3





Youth Substance Use – Key Points

Where Youth are Getting substances – this continues to be dominated by friends and family as the primary sources for obtaining alcohol, marijuana, and prescription drugs

Most Common Reasons for Using Alcohol and Drugs:

- 1. To have fun 42.5%
- 2. To get high or feel good 35.9%
- 3. To deal with stress from my school 35%
- 4. To deal with stress from my parents and family -30.2%
- 5. I was feeling sad or down 30.1%
- 6. To deal with stress from my peers or friends -22.6%

Most Common Reasons for Not Using Alcohol and Drugs:

- 1. Not interested in drugs 87%
- 2. Parents would be disappointed 70.7%
- 3. It can harm my body 69.8%
- 4. Illegal and I could get arrested 55.9%
- 5. Parents would take away privileges 54.5%
- 6. Other adults would be disappointed 49.6%

These measures of risk and protective factors are where the AYS is really valuable to schools and substance abuse coalitions \rightarrow it tells you where to focus your resources and efforts to produce change



Benefits of the Survey

- Participating schools & districts receive customized reports
- Community-level data available (Data Visualization Center)
- Supports funding efforts for stakeholders
- Assists in driving local decision-making and programming
- Compliment Social Determinants of Health


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

Reasons Behind the Mission



Youth in Mohave, Pima, and Cochise Counties report high rates of family conflict, parent attitudes favorable to drug use, and poor family management.

(Arizona Youth Survey, 2022) resulting in higher rates of juvenile arrests for drug use, possession, and driving under the influence.

Arizona ranks 10th

nationally for prescription drug and heroin overdose

with the state's highest per capita drug death rate and highest prescribing rates with 127.5 annual prescriptions/100 people¹.

Coalitions have been mobilized by in community sectors to address community-level substance use/abuse issues; implement strategies and activities based on data and culture of community to reduce and prevent substance use/abuse.

AZYP's Strengthening Families Project

is a free, in-person, 8-week program for parents/guardians and their youth ages 10 to 14, which increases family connection, reduce family conflict, and connect families to the community.




The project utilizes the evidence-based curricula from Iowa State University - Strengthening Families Program 10 - 14 and Rx360.

This program covers topics including peer pressure resistance, reducing stress, finding our family values, better communication skills, problem solving, goal setting, and understanding each other better.

Each week, the families are provided with a **hot meal** to share with one another to kick off the session.

42 Adults, 44 Youth Served

42 adults and 44 youth in the past year have participated in the SFP 10 - 14 Program with the AZYP Strengthening Families Project in four different counties in Arizona: Mohave, Pima, Cochise, and Pinal.

Three families reported having a child with special needs.

One family reported as having one family member needing ASL interpretation.

Twelve families were active in the juvenile probation system.
