A Brief History of PPP

ACHIEVING OUR MISSION STATEMENT THROUGH SERVING ARIZONA'S YOUTH & FAMILIES WITH SAF PROGRAMS

Pima Prevention Partnership (PPP) is a non-profit 501(c)3 founded in 1992. PPP has been creating conditions for change with youth, families, institutions, and community groups. The focus of PPP is to support, and help underserved adolescents and their families, providing intervention, prevention, family strengthening and mentoring services.

- For 25 years have implemented Strengthening Families evidence-based curriculum
- For 17 years have implemented Staying Connected to Your Teen evidence-based curriculum
- Y2Y has been implemented for 6 years
- Since 2011 present PPP has been funded by the Parent's Commission:
 - Serving more than 1,100 families and 250+ youth in Pima County

TO YOUR TEEN (SCT)

- Five-week session program
- For parents/guardians with their youth ages 10-17 in middle or high school
- Video-based
- Seeks to address specific risk factors among teens and increase protective factors for youth by teaching parents effective strategies for positive, open communication, and building & maintaining strong, caring relationships within the home.



- **❖Six-session program**
- ❖ For Parents/Guardians with their youth ages 10-14
- Emphasizes the importance of reducing risk factors while increasing protective factors

OUTCOMES YEAR 2

Adults Family Cohesion

37.6% reported increase on post retrospective survey. Target increase was 10%.

Youth Family Cohesion

30.5% reported increase on post retrospective survey. Target increase was 10%.

Parenting Partners Cohesion

100% reported increase on post retrospective survey. Target increase was 80%.

Youth Perception of Risk/Harm

16.3% reported increase on post retrospective survey. Target increase was 5%.

Parental Engagement and Capacity to Influence Change

92.7% reported increase on post retrospective survey. Target increase was 80%.


One Voice Youth Empowerment




